- The file must be in PDF format (max size 10 MB).
- The assignments must be the original work of the students. They are strongly advised against plagiarism.

- Completely filled IA cover sheet must be included as the first page of the assignment.
- Handwritten essays will not be accepted.
- File name of each file should be same as the student's name followed by the paper code.
- Students must not contact any individual faculty member in any case.
